

## Big Idea:

The story of the flood reveals a God who is both holy Judge and gracious Redeemer. Because God is our Redeemer, we can put our confidence in him and in his promises.

# **Thought Exercise:**

- Who are the Nephilim?
- Who are the sons of God and the daughters of men?
- What is the take-away from this specific passage?

#### Items for discussion:

#### Serious Situation (Gen 6:5-12)

- Rebellion affects the whole, but a remnant remains intact.
- What are the visible symptoms of the disease of sin?
- Even before the Law was given, there was an expectation of appropriate behavior.
- Violence and corruption fill the hearts of all mankind.

## Extreme Obedience (6:13-22)

- Have you ever been asked to do something that made no sense? How did you respond?
- Why was it necessary for Noah to bring the animals along?

# Holy and Gracious (7:11-12; 7:23; 8:3)

- God's judgment is revealed in a difficult and harsh fashion. How do we reconcile this aspect of Gopd's character with his faithful love and providence?
- God's grace is revealed in the new creation and in the covenant with Noah and mankind.
- What is different about this new beginning than the first one in Eden?

#### The Promise (8:21; 9:7-17)

- Even in a new start, God's purpose for creation remains consistent. What are the similarities between these two "beginnings"?
- What are some connections you have made between everyday items and significant life events?
- God is faithful and never fails to keep his promises.
